THE GREETING

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all. **And also with you.**

On this most holy night we enter into the three days of our Lord's passion, death and resurrection, the journey from the supper table to the cross, from the cross to Easter dawn.

This is the night when Christ the Lamb of God gave himself into the hands of those who would betray him. This is the night when Christ gathered with his disciples in the upper room. This is the night when Christ our Lord gave us this holy feast, that as we break the bread and drink the cup we may here proclaim his holy sacrifice, and come at the last to his table in heaven.

This is the night when Christ took a towel and washed the disciples' feet, showing us how to honour and serve one another in love. This is the night for watching and prayer.

RECEIVING THE OILS OF HEALING, BAPTISM AND CHRISM

We give ourselves freely to the demands of these great days, confident that those who die in Christ will surely live with him. As we begin, we receive from our bishop Paul, the holy oils blessed and set apart for the sacramental life of our community.

The Oil of Healing is presented:

The oil of the sick.

Celebrant

By the laying on of hands and anointing with this oil, and with the prayerful support of this community, may those who are sick experience the healing presence of Christ. **Amen.**

The Oil of Baptism is presented: The oil of baptism.

Celebrant

Anointed with this oil, and assisted by the example of this community, may those who are to be baptized know that Christ calls them by name and makes them his own and shares with them his victory over sin and the power of evil.

Amen.

The oil of Chrism is presented The oil of chrism.

Celebrant

Anointed with this fragrant oil, may all who are baptized and confirmed, all who are ordained to the service of God's people, and this community whose house of prayer is dedicated to God's glory, fill the world with the sweet fragrance of Christ's gospel and be built up as living stones into a temple filled with the Holy Spirit. Amen.

PRAYERS OF PENITENCE

God our Father, you have invited us to share in the supper which your Son gave to his Church to proclaim his death until he comes:

May he nourish us by his presence, and unite us in his love;
who is alive and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

CELEBRATING AT THE LORD'S TABLE

THE PREPARATION OF THE TABLE

At the Eucharist we are with our crucified and risen Lord. We know that it was not only our ancestors, but we who are redeemed and brought forth from slavery to freedom, from mourning to feasting. We know that as he was with them in the upper room so our Lord is here with us now.

Until the Kingdom of God comes, let us celebrate this feast.

THE TAKING OF THE BREAD AND WINE

Blessed are you, Lord, God of the universe, you bring forth bread from the earth. Blessed be God for ever.

Blessed are you, Lord, God of the universe, you create the fruit of the vine. Blessed be God for ever.

THE GREAT THANKSGIVING

The Lord is here. **His Spirit is with us.**

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give him thanks and praise.

Father, almighty and everliving God, at all times and in all places it is right to give you thanks and praise;

And now we give you thanks because, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; and on the night before he suffered, sitting at table with his disciples, he instituted these holy mysteries, that we, redeemed by his death and restored to life by his resurrection, might be partakers of his divine nature.

And so with all your people, with angels and archangels, and with all the company of heaven, we proclaim your great and glorious name, for ever praising you and singing:

The **SANCTUS** and **BENEDICTUS** are sung by the Choir

Blessed are you, Father, the creator and sustainer of all things; you made us in your own image, male and female you created us; even when we turned away from you, you never ceased to care for us, but in your love and mercy you freed us from the slavery of sin, giving your only begotten Son to become man and suffer death on the cross to redeem us: he made there the one complete and all-sufficient sacrifice for the sins of the whole world: he instituted. and in his holy Gospel commanded us to continue, a perpetual memory of his precious death until he comes again:

On the night that he was betrayed he took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples saying, Take, eat, this is my body which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup; and when he had given thanks to you, he gave it to them saying, Drink this, all of you, for this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Therefore, Father, with this bread and this cup we do as Christ your Son commanded: we remember his passion and death, we celebrate his resurrection and ascension, and we look for the coming of his Kingdom.

Accept through him, our great high priest, this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; and as we eat and drink these holy gifts, grant by the power of the life-giving Spirit that we may be made one in your holy Church and partakers of the body and blood of your Son, that he may dwell in us and we in him;

Through the same Jesus Christ our Lord, by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory are yours, Almighty Father for ever and ever. Amen.

POST-COMMUNION PRAYER

Lord Jesus Christ, we thank you that in this wonderful sacrament you have given us the memorial of your passion: Grant us so to reverence the sacred mysteries of your body and blood, that we may know within ourselves and show forth in our lives the fruit of your redemption, for you are alive and reign, now and for ever. Amen.

TANTUM ERGO SACRAMENTUM

Of the glorious body telling, O my tongue, its mysteries sing, and the blood, all price excelling, which the world's eternal King, in a spotless womb once dwelling, shed for this world's ransoming. Given for us, for us descending, of a virgin to proceed, man with man in converse blending, scattered he the gospel seed, till his sojourn drew to ending, which he closed in wondrous deed.

At the last great supper lying circled by his chosen band, duly with the law complying, first he finished its command, then, immortal food supplying, gave himself by his own hand.

Word-made flesh, by word he maketh bread his very flesh to be; man in wine Christ's blood partaketh: and if senses fail to see, faith alone the true heart waketh to behold the mystery.

THE FINAL READING

Mark 14: 32-50

At the end of the reading almost all the Cathedral's lights are turned off signifying the descent into the darkness of Christ's trials and crucifixion.

Remain standing for THE STRIPPING OF THE ALTARS

In silence, the altars are stripped and crosses are covered as

PSALM 22

is sung

Those leaving at this stage are asked to do so <u>in complete silence</u> and not to congregate outside the Cathedral.

THE WATCH

The Watch takes place in the Dean's Chapel for one hour as soon as the Stripping of the Altars is complete.
